

Don't Let The Bed Bugs Bite

Venue: Stockwood Discovery Centre (75 minutes)

Session summary:

The session focuses on Roman medicines. It starts by considering some of the pests and diseases Romans would have dealt with e.g. head lice and bedbugs. Children are then challenged through three activities to prescribe the correct herbal medicine for a patient, mix an insect repellent from dried herbs and olive oil and to make a votive offering out of clay. The whole session considers how Roman doctors treated their patients and called upon their belief in the gods to help cure.



Learning objectives:

- Recall some of the pests and diseases people suffered with during the Roman period.
- Compare how the Romans treated such pests with how we would treat them today.
- Consider the importance of religion in the understanding of illnesses and medicine.
- Make a simple herbal insect repellent.
- Make a votive offering to take back to school.



Learning outcomes:

At the end of this session children will be able to:

- Recall some of the pests and diseases Romans suffered with and how doctors use herbal remedies as cures.
- They will be able to draw comparisons between Roman and modern treatments.
- Children will have also started to consider how important religion was in some Roman treatments.





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Additional information: This session uses herbs, olive oil and air-drying clay.

It is useful to know if any members of your class have learning, physical or sensory difficulties or illnesses that may affect their enjoyment of the session.

Suggested activities:

Before the visit

It is useful for the children to know a little about daily Roman life including housing and the importance of bathing.

After the visit

Can your children find out any information about Roman gods or goddesses connected with health and medicine?
